Secret Society, Spilling a Few Secrets By JAMES BARRON

For more than two centuries, the Freemasons and their grandiose rituals have played a secretive, mysterious role in American life. One of the Masons' symbols looks a lot like the all-seeing eye on the back of every \$1 bill. And look whose picture is on the other side.

George Washington was not the first Mason, and not the only famous one. Mozart worked thinly disguised touches of Masonry into operas. Fourteen presidents and everyone from the Rev. Norman Vincent Peale to the comedian Red Skelton belonged. Masons presided when the cornerstone was laid at the Statue of Liberty.

But the Masons' numbers have been steadily dwindling – whatever their secrets are, they apparently do not have one for avoiding death – and apparently do not have one for avoiding death – and their ranks have been graying. So the <u>New York State</u> Masons have followed other state Masonic societies in doing something that they would have once considered heretical: they are actively reaching out for new members. And, in the process, a famously reticent fraternal organization that now puts a premium on its community service has lifted its veil of secrecy just a bit.

The Masons are not giving out the secret words that members are supposed to say to get into meetings (although these days, simply showing a dues card might do). But the Masons are giving public tours of the New York Grand Lodge Headquarters.

So people can see the gilded ceiling, the marble walls, the benches along the sides for the rank and file and, at either end, the throne-like chairs for high-ranking Masons. And, in a conference room next door, there is more gold, though it is only paint on a copy of a larger-than-life statue of George Washington.

The lodge also hired a public relations firm to spread the word about its 225th anniversary, which was last month. And the Masons have run advertisements in movie theaters and run one-day classes to award the first three Masonic degrees in a single session. Until then, would-be Masons had to spend months learning what they needed to know to rise from Entered Apprentice to Fellowcraft to Master Mason.

"We're still not thinking of it as recruiting or trying to amass people," said Thomas M. Savini, the director of the library at the New York Grand Lodge Headquarters, on West 23rd Street and the Avenue of the Americas, "but I think we've reached a point where we realized that not saying anything isn't making it any easier."

They had also reached a point where they could not ignore what others were saying about them in "The Da Vinci Code" and other bestsellers like "The Book of Fate" by Brad Meltzer.

"What 'The Da Vinci Code' gave us was an opportunity to say, 'Here's what we are," Mr. Savini said.

What there is, inside the grand lodge headquarters, are a dozen ornate rooms where some 60 lodges still hold meetings regularly.

Those dozen rooms have no windows. Leading the way into one of them, the Grand Master, or leader of all Masons in New York State, Neal I. Bidnick, said the layout was no different from any other lodge room in the world, with an altar and candles in the center. At the one end are two pieces of stone, each about the size of a cinder block – one uncut, the other finished.

"We take a good man and polish the rough edges," Mr. Bidnick said. (The Masons do not admit women.)

In the hallways of the grand lodge headquarters, the walls are crowded with framed photographs of Masons past and present, but mostly past: Hubert H. Humphrey, the former vice president; and William J. Bratton, the former police commissioner who is now the chief of police in Los Angeles.

But there are fewer names on the membership rolls than there once were: 54,000 in New York, down from a high of 346,413 in 1929. Membership rose again after World War II, rising to 307,323 in 1957 before beginning a long slide. As Mr. Bidnick explains it, New York's Masons are heavily involved in community service, underwriting medical research and supplying 29,000 American flags, one for every public school classroom in the city. But still there are the secret rooms where Masons gather.

"Why do we bring them into a room like this?" Mr. Bidnick asked. "Basically, all our rituals are designed to be educational. All these things they show you on TV, the assumptions are wrong."

He has heard the conspiracy theories. "We're often asked why we have a G" as a symbol, Mr. Bidnick said. "We had a person in here from CNN before 'The Da Vinci Code.' She pointed out that only in English and German does the word for God begin with a G. But masonry is an educational institution, so that G stands for geometry."

And, on one wall, is a stained-glass panel with a G in a square and compasses.

Geometry is but one of the seven liberal arts. A Mason who could not remember the other six would need only to look up, for they are written on the ceiling: arithmetic, rhetoric, logic, grammar, music and astronomy. The four cardinal virtues – fortitude, prudence, temperance and justice – are written there, too.

And Mr. Bidnick said when Masons refer to God, they refer to the great architect of the universe. To hear him and Mr. Savini tell it, there is nothing theological in the reference. Mr. Savini said that Masonry was dogma-free. "It doesn't tell a man how to interpret a symbol, which leaves it open to people outside to misinterpret it," he said.

They would not describe in detail what happens in the room when members are present for a lodge meeting. Mr. Savini did dispel what he said were misconceptions – that there are secret tattoos, for example. "Masonry has nothing to do with tattoos," he said. "You don't get a tattoo when you become a Mason."

Still, he himself has a tattoo, though not a Masonic tattoo.

And Mr. Savini points out that the eye on the dollar bill is not really a Masonic symbol. "We use the eye," he said, "but opticians use the eye. It makes us look ridiculous if we say it links into some Masonic connection that was not there."

... I know that the last great lesson of Freemasonry -- the value of personal integrity and the sanctity of one's word -- is a lesson for all people in all times; I therefore vow to be a man of my word.

... I know that *Masonry's power is best exercised when its Light is shared* with the world at large; I therefore vow to bring the best of myself to my Lodge, in order that my growth might be fostered and nurtured, and to present myself to the world as a working Freemason, on the path to building a more perfect temple.

Because I am a Freemason,

these values and aspirations are guideposts for my progress through life.

9/11 Remembered

Publicity Lodge No. 1000 celebrated the 225th Anniversary of the Grand Lodge of the State of New York in Lower Manhattan at the John Street United Methodist Church, and at Liberty Plaza, the site of the World Trade Center disaster, on the day before the Fifth Anniversary of 9/11 on Sunday, September 10, 2006.

The morning began with a continental breakfast served to participants as they arrived, beginning at 8:00 AM. An organ prelude, performed by Bro. Erik E. Carlson, Organist, ended precisely at 9:00 AM, when the Interfaith Service began with a welcome extended by The Rev. Jason P. Radmacher, Minister of the John Street United Methodist Church.

RW Raymond P. Alvarez, PG Rep., Master of Publicity Lodge, led the preparation for worship, which was followed by congregational singing of America the Beautiful. The Invocation was given by Bro. Robert J. Mahony, Senior Warden, and was followed by four readings - from the Christian Tradition by W Anthony J. Miller, PM; from the Taoist Tradition by Bro. Eric J. Shorter, Junior Warden; from the Islamic Tradition by Bro. Mahony, SW; and from the Hebrew Tradition by Bro. Alan B. Stolzer, Marshal. The Master then led the congregation in prayer, followed by the singing of Let There Be Peace on Earth. The Benediction was given by RW John R. Prout, PG Treas., Treasurer of the Lodge.

The Master then called on W Dennis A. Daugherty, P.M. & Trustee of the Lodge, to assemble the Brethren in procession. The following procession was formed:

Bro. William D. Baughman, J.M.C. of Consolidated Lodge No. 31, led the company, and carried the National Flag; and then, in pairs, Bro. Alain R. Hain, J.M.C. and RW Eugene Carlson, PDDGM & PM of Publicity Lodge, as Stewards with staves; Bro. Bruce A. Laue, member of Kane Lodge No. 454 and Bro. Moises (Matt) A. Olivas, S.S. of Consolidated Lodge; Bro. Stolzer and Bro. John A. Unruh, a member of Publicity Lodge, as Masters of Ceremony with staves; Bro. Lance Dashefsky, SW of Consolidated Lodge No. 1184; WJohn J. Barral, Master of James W. Husted/Fiat Lux Lodge No.



1068; W Hayrettin Kiltic, Master of Kane Lodge No. 454 and W Stevan Nikolic, Master of Consolidated Lodge No. 31; and, as a lone parader, W Valery Nikolaev, Master of St. John's Lodge No. 1; Bro. Joseph Aoun, S.M.C. of Publicity Lodge and Bro. Chuka Ebere, member of Publicity Lodge, as Deacons with staves; RW John R. Prout, PG Treas. and RW Martin L. Kanter, PDDGM, First Manhattan District; Bro. Mahony, SW and Bro. Shorter, JW; RW Christopher L. Allen, DDGM, First Manhattan District, and RW Alvarez, Master; and W Miller and VW Paul D. Reitz, PAGL & PM & Secretary of Kane Lodge, as Stewards with staves. WJason P. Sheridan, PM & Sec'y of St. John's Lodge No. 1, forwent his position in the procession to take photographs.

The Parade proceeded west from the church to Nassau Street, then left on Nassau to Liberty Street, and then right on Liberty Street to Liberty Plaza. W Daugherty aligned the group in an east-west line near the chain link fence that serves as the south border of The Site, and all looked down into The Pit. The Master addressed those assembled, and RW Prout offered prayer. Bro. Hain, JMC, led the Moment of Remembrance, and read out The List of the six events which occurred on the morning of September 11, 2001, during the 102 minutes that changed Life in the United States of America forever:

- 8:46 AM Flight 11 crashed into the World Trade Center North Tower,
- 9:03 AM Flight 175 crashed into the World Trade Center South Tower,
- 9:37 AM Flight 77 crashed into The Pentagon,



9:59 AM The South Tower of the World Trade Center collapsed,

10:06 AM Flight 93 crashed in a field in Pennsylvania, and

10:28 AM The North Tower of the World Trade Center collapsed.

Each event was commemorated by the sounding of a chime.

The Master offered a closing prayer, and called for a Moment of Silence, during which the Master sounded TAPS. The group then returned to the John Street United Methodist Church in procession, and enjoyed coffee and conversation prior to departure from the church.

Others attending the service included Mrs. Elaine Alvarez, Mrs. Trudy Reitz, Ms. Brandl Frey, Ms. Sherry Laue and Mr. Vince Dominguez.




What a powerful impression! What a Public Relations coup !!!

The Masonic Blood Donor Program, a community oriented mainstay, continues to assist communities throughout the state to acquire and maintain an adequate and safe blood supply. Sheldon D. Stachel the program chairman is working hard to get ALL districts involved. Remember, BLOOD is a priceless gift - a lifesaver. The Child ID Program continues to be the most dynamic community involvement program in this jurisdiction. Last year more than 42,000 children participated. This year, the new chairman, Charles Uhle, has raised The goal to 60,000 children. The committee has been hard at work introducing the new system into the program. The Community Service Program is hard at work revising the DeWitt Clinton Award requirements so that those submitting a nomination will have a much better understanding as to what is and is not required when recommending a person or organization for this award. Similarly Jordan Kaplan, the program chairman and his committee, are developing an award to replace the existing Heart in Hands Award for non Masons and non Masonic organizations.

MSAT is an intensive three-day training workshop for educators. Over the course of the three days the school team learns to identify at-risk behaviors, design interventions that have a high probability of success, and create appropriate referrals for students who may be at -risk for substance abuse, depression, suicide or violence. Program Chairman, Tim McMullin has promulgated the training sessions for the 2006-2007 school year. Have you spoken to the schools in your area about this FREE program? Tim is always available to receive your questions either by telephone or E-mail.

The software upgrade for the new Child ID Systems is available. The upgrade provides for easier CD burning, protects from multiple subjects being burned to a single CD, and allows for the system operator to proceed to the next subject while burning is taking place. The upgrade also reduces the time required to process a subject from 4 minutes to 3 minutes.

The CCI Child ID System is the most comprehensive tool available on the market to assist law enforcement officials in safely locating missing or abducted children. It provides for a digital photograph, along with a complete set of fingerprints and critical statistical data, burned to a mini CD. In the case a subject is reported missing, the data on the CD can easily be uploaded to the Department of Criminal Services database and the Center for Exploited & Missing Children reporting system. The information can then be broadcast through the normal channels and the search for the missing subject can commence earlier and with more accurate data.

Your Grand Lodge has purchased 18 complete units - 4 for each region and 2 for training. In addition, at least 10 Districts have purchased their own units. The 4 Regional Chairmen that have equipment to loan to District / Lodge Child ID Teams are: Metro - Joe Keeler (<u>keeler533@msn.com</u>); Hudson-Champlain - Gary Bolster (<u>glbolster@nychip.org</u>); Mid-State - Ken Bates (<u>kbates@twcny.rr.com</u>); and, Western - John Dwyer (<u>dwyjo3@aol.com</u>).

Simon has earned 40 merit badges, is a Brotherhood member of the Order of the Arrow .At his English Boarding school, Simon is : Captain of the Shooting team, Captain of the Chess team, a Corporal and Company Commander in the Combined Cadet Force and has completed the Duke of Edinburgh Gold Award. He is currently pursuing the International Baccalaureate and plans to attend Cambridge University.



Some Thoughts on 225th Anniversary In-Lodge Rededication Services

I would like to congratulate our Lodges who have participated in the 225th Anniversary In-Lodge Rededication Services. Those which I have attended have been moving affairs; an opportunity to not only recite our obligations but to reflect on them. Some Brothers have commented that this is the first time they have really done so. Let's face it, when we knelt at the altar and took our Degrees, we were more focused on repeating the words correctly than their meaning. For those of us who have conferred Degrees, standing at the altar, we were more focused on the next line even as we provided the former to the candidates.

In our Obligations, we discuss our duty to God, our neighbors, and ourselves. In our Third Degree Charge, we are reminded that it is our duty to make the most and best of ourselves, to identify true manhood and exemplify it. This shouldn't come easy for us, it's a lifetime's work, but our Obligations lay the foundation and offer us the blueprints. The Masonic Compact codifies it for us, specifically reminding us that, because we are Freemasons, we believe in freedom of religion and religious tolerance, the importance of education, our traditions and the importance of our ritual, charity and personal community service, patriotism, friendship, family, fidelity to each other, the importance of personal integrity, and the sanctity of one's word.

My Brothers, this is what Freemasonry is about; we're not in politics or the real estate business. While a physical location is required to meet, a building is not a Lodge; there is not a word in our obligations about roofs, boilers, or replacing screen doors. There is not a word about seeking rank or title or the privilege of position, in fact our Charge reminds us not to measure our worth by money or titles but by the texture of our character. At this time of rededication, I ask that you leave your buildings to Trustee meetings and consider basing your trestleboards on the true work of Masonry set out in our ritual as succinctly defined in our Masonic Compact.

For 225 years in New York, and centuries before that around the world, Freemasonry has provided Leaders in every profession and circumstance. In the Individual Development Course, we discuss the four traits of a Leader: Cultivating Trust, Setting Priorities, Self-Discipline, and Casting Your Vision. We also teach that each of these is based on establishing your personal core values. If setting priorities is based on determining what is most important to us, that importance must be based on not only material and practical values but also those which led us to Freemasonry. Self Discipline is based on maintaining our priorities and showing that we can conduct ourselves ethically and morally. Understanding our own core values will enable us to formulate a vision to share with our families, friends, coworkers, Lodges, and communities. With these values established in our hearts and practices, we will cultivate trust in those who surround us, enabling us to Lead and become the new George Washingtons and Benjamin Franklins. This is how Masonry makes good men better, and better men build a better world.

I hope that the warmth that you felt or will feel at your Rededications will carry over into your Masonry and your lives in the months and years to come. Consider which of our values are most important to you and how you can implement them in setting your daily priorities. Consider which you do not find relevant to yourself and ask yourself why; can you honestly say that any of the values we have outlined is not important? If YOU'RE not sure, get a dictionary and look it up, then speak with your Brothers about it.

We are not alone in recognizing the principles and tenets that not only made men great but have built a great nation. We are each privileged to have those plans imprinted on our hearts and I urge each of you to achieve your own personal greatness through the lessons of our Craft.

Our Legacy thanks to you

A half century of discovery and innovation is certainly a cause for celebration. As we approach the Masonic Medical Research Laboratory's 50th Anniversary, our Board of Directors has launched a *Campaign for Discovery* aimed at celebrating five decades of dedicated service to humanity in which the contributions of our scientists have translated into renewed hope and a better quality of life for millions of individuals worldwide. As we celebrate our accomplishments of the past, it behooves us to begin to chart our course for the future with an eye at accelerating discovery and building on the momentum that we have been so fortunate to enjoy. With this aspiration in mind, it is our goal to increase our endowments by \$15 million by 2008 and expand our base of support so as to be able to further fuel the fires of innovation.

Founded in 1958, the MMRL has undergone several transformations geared at keeping our Laboratory at the cutting edge of discovery. Our institute, the vision of GM Raymond C. Ellis, has been uniquely successful in fulfilling its mission to provide a healthier tomorrow for all of us and our loved ones. Our legacy of scientific breakthroughs has helped to provide physicians the means to better diagnose disease as well as novel treatments and cures. These advances have helped to identify and design new heart medications and have provided fundamental knowledge that has aided in the development of life-saving technologies such as pacemakers, implantable cardioverter defibrillators (ICD), and automatic external defibrillators (AED).

Initially dedicated exclusively to basic medical research focused on fundamental mechanism of cell function needed to sustain life, our Laboratory today is dedicated to translating basic knowledge into therapies and cures of human disease. With the recent introduction of a Molecular Genetics program, the MMRL is now integrally involved in clinical research specifically designed to identify the genetic basis for human disease responsible for abnormal rhythms of the heart, including ventricular tachycardia and fibrillation, which can lead to sudden cardiac death, as well as atrial fibrillation, which can reduce quality of life and dramatically increase the risk of stroke.

We take pride in having one of the most complete and coordinated teams working in an environment that fosters tight integration of highly sophisticated techniques. The MMRL is currently one of a handful of medical research centers worldwide capable of studying the genetic causes of the lethal cardiac arrhythmias responsible for sudden cardiac death in young adults, children and infants and in designing gene-specific therapies. Although MMRL investigators do not interact with patients directly, through collaborations with physicians worldwide, we are provided blood from patients suffering from abnormal rhythms of the heart. Following extraction of the DNA, genetic sequencing is performed to identify errors in the genetic code, known as mutations. The mutant gene is then cloned and expressed in a human cell line so as to identify the nature of the cellular defect. The characteristics of the defect provide us specific direction for the design of novel drugs and other innovative approaches to therapy. Thus, starting and ending with patients in the clinic, we are able to bring the research full circle by delving into the cause of disease at the genetic level, its root basis.

Over the past year, we have identified genetic defects that are responsible for sudden death of infants (including sudden infant death syndrome), sudden death in young children, and adults. Working together with colleagues in Italy, our scientists were the first to link Sudden infant death syndrome (SIDS) to an abnormal rhythm of the heart associated with the long QT syndrome. We discovered the first cardiac gene defect responsible for SIDS as well as the first gene defect responsible for sudden death in your adults. Several months ago we identified a genetic defect that determines whether individuals are susceptible to sudden death after a heart attack. Finally, we have discovered a couple of genes that predispose individuals to atrial fibrillation. As a consequence of these findings, we have been to identify and develop several new treatments for these problems.

We recently announced this new strategy for the treatment of atrial fibrillation at the Heart Rhythm Society annual scientific sessions and look forward to the start of clinical trials.

We are deeply indebted to all who have supported us in these efforts in the past and invite you to join our growing family of friends and to partner with us in future research. Exciting discoveries lie just beyond the horizon and it is my hope that together we can bring them within reach.



Carroll Lodge No. 1147, Frewsburg, NY Assists in hunt for Fugitive

In April, 2006 Ralph "Bucky" Phillips, age 44, escaped from the Erie County (NY) Jail in Wende, NY. He was within four days of being released on parole but instead he managed to pry a hole in a ceiling and escaped via the roof of the facility.



After his escape a large contingent of Erie County Deputy Sheriffs, led by Sheriff Timothy B. Howard (who is a retired New York State Police command officer) combed the area, including the local Indian Reservations to no avail. State and local police manned roadblocks in an attempt to find Phillips. Several weeks later Phillips allegedly shot a New York State Trooper in Chemung County after being stopped in a stolen car. He again escaped the area in another stolen vehicle.

In August two New York State Troopers were ambushed and shot while conducting a surveillance of the home occupied by a former girlfriend of Phillips. It is suspected that Phillips is responsible for the shootings. One Trooper, Joseph Longobardo died several days later as a result of his injuries.

Phillips was spotted in several locations over the next weeks. Twenty two constantly operating roadblocks were manned in the Chautauqua County area during that period. On September 5, 2006 he was spotted just south of the Town of Kiantone in Pennsylvania. He again slipped by officers and apparently headed into the Warren, PA area.

On September 8, 2006 Phillips, again in another stolen car, was stopped in Pennsylvania and escaped by running away from officers. He stole another vehicle and was next seen in New York State in the middle of the night just north of the state line. A pursuit ensued and after a few miles Phillips jumped out of the stolen vehicle and again began to run. Available state and local police immediately began to seal off the area to keep Phillips contained. K-9 units were called in to the area.

About 6:30 AM the news media was broadcasting the events. Carroll Lodge No. 1147 is located one mile north of the Pennsylvania state line, south of Frewsburg, New York. W William R. Nelson (Lieutenant, Chautauqua Co. Sheriff's Dept.), RW P. Michael Nielsen (retired Zone Sergeant, New York State Police) and RW Ronald L. Pigman (PDDGM Chautauqua District) all Past Masters of the Lodge realized that the Carroll Lodge building would be a perfect place to offer some refreshments for the police that were converging on the area. W Brother Nelson was on duty at the time so RW Brothers Nielsen and Pigman opened the Lodge and started to make coffee to offer to the incoming officers.



Soon several command officers in the New York State Police arrived on the scene and noted that the Lodge would be the perfect place for a Command Post for the search. Soon tables were set up in the Lodge foyer and more telephone equipment was brought in. The Chautauqua County Sheriff's Dept. Technical Services Division set up a command communications center in the Lodge room, complete with radio equipment able to contact all agencies, including the Pennsylvania State Police who were operating just one mile south, fax and copy machines, several computers, satellite views and road maps projected on screens and

portable radio charging equipment.

The dining room area of the building served as a check-in point for incoming officers, a rest and rehabilitation area including several hundred submarine sandwiches, hot dogs, pizza and water, Gatorade, and soda pop. Members of the Kiantone Fire Dept.,(of which Bro. Nielsen is a past chief) Kiantone Fire Dept. Ladies Auxiliary and the Frewsburg Fire Dept. prepared many sandwiches and maintained the food service area

during the entire event. By evening there were over three hundred police officers from all jurisdictions, local, county, state and federal working the area.

Shortly after 8:00 PM Phillips was spotted in Pennsylvania, surrounded by many officers and helicopters, and soon emerged from a corn field and surrendered. US Marshals immediately took him to Buffalo, NY for arraignment. The incident ended without any further bloodshed.





The history of "Bucky" Phillips goes back to when he was a little more than ten years old. He thought it was fun to steal bicycles at an early age, and soon graduated to stealing cars and committing burglaries. He was being arrested regularly by local and state police. By the time he was sixteen years old he had stolen one hundred vehicles. Hopefully Phillips will never again see clear sky without looking through bars. Numerous charges are being filed against him and the investigation into the shooting of the two State Troopers is continuing.

The Masonic fraternity is all about helping mankind. September 8, 2006 is a day when Carroll Lodge No. 1147 was able to do just that.
